Welcome to LaborFest 2011 77th Anniversary of the 1934 San Francisco General Strike & 150th Anniversary of American Civil War Labor Fights Back From Egypt to Wisconsin and San Francisco

LaborFest was established in 1994 to commemorate the San Francisco general strike in 1934, and the LaborFest Organizing Committee uses this occasion to bring labor culture, art, history and films to working people in San Francisco and Northern California. We are also seeking to videotape and stream some of the events so those who are unable to attend can watch the events on the Internet. The 34' strike was a

turning point for working people not only in San Francisco but the Bay Area as hundreds of thousands of workers joined unions in the middle of the last great depression. Today, with mass unemployment in California, we face great challenges again.

Labor and the trade unions are under a virtual state of war with one attack after another on labor's basic rights. The coordinated political corporate propaganda attack

on basic worker and human rights continues unabated. Some are even seeking to bring back child labor and the elimination of all union protections and health and safety rights.

The right of public workers to negotiate their working conditions is being challenged not only in Wisconsin, but also throughout the country. Public workers are being blamed for the decline of the economy and the deficits in state and local governments. The right to a decent wage and a defined pension, and even Medicare and social security that allows retirees to live decently is also under threat.

At the same time, the right to public education faces the greatest threat since the 1930's as thousands of teachers and education workers are laid off, and the privatization of our public colleges and universities continues unabated.

This year, LaborFest will honor not only the San Francisco general strike of 1934 but also the 125th anniversary of May Day, which began in Chicago in 1886 with immigrant workers. At the time, the fight for an 8-hour day took on an international character with actions throughout the world. Today, many US workers including even those with union jobs must work 2 and 3 jobs to pay their bills.

We will also commemorate the 100th anniversary of the



New York **Triangle Fire**, where 146 mostly immigrant Jewish and Italian women were killed. The doors were locked to the roof and the lack of strong health and safety laws were a direct cause of the deaths. Today we need to defend and strengthen our health and safety protections as they are under attack as well.

It is also the 150th anniversary of the US Civil War. This war against slavery in the South was not only

an issue for the South and the survival of the union, but for California, where some slaveholders sought to make California a slave state. Archie Lee an enslaved African American was brought to California in the 1840's, escaped, was captured and escaped again to get his freedom right here in San Francisco. We will honor the workers who are building the new Eastern Span of the San Francisco Bay Bridge with a maritime history boat tour, and will also continue with our walk on the Golden Gate Bridge with the skilled union workers who keep it strong. Without our labor, there would be no bridge, no public education and rights that defend working people.

Only by education, unity and action can labor reclaim it's power and rights and LaborFest hopes to contribute to this task. We thank the many unions and members who have contributed to this festival financially and with their labor. We thank the working people of this city and this country whose labor and creativity have contributed to our lives.

Talk by Harvey Schwartz and Mike Daly

In 1939, the US government held the first of five trials in an effort to deport Australian born ILWU president Harry Bridges for being a member of the Communist Party. The first trial was on Angel Island, which also was an immigration station for newly arrived immigrants and war prisoners. ILWU historian Harvey Schwartz will provide a report on the effort to deport Harry Bridges and Ironworker Mike Daly will report on the history of immigration of this important island, especially Chinese builders of California. Learn about the arrival at Angel Island of the Pearl River Delta Taishan people who were largely responsible for building the early infrastructure of California.





Produced, directed, filmed and edited by; Julie Cavanagh (teacher), Darren Marrelli (school social worker), Norm Scott (retired teacher), Mollie Bruhn (teacher), Lisa Donlan (parent). It is the antidote to the massive propaganda campaign to push privatization of education in the film "Waiting For Superman" last year. The film was also made by teachers and parents and is an antidote to the pro-privatization propaganda.



The organized coordinated destruction of public education through charter schools and making the schools "profit centers" pushed by the Bill Gates Foundation and the Broad Foundation is a critical issue for all those interested in defending public education.

In an epidemic of murders, thousands of women workers in Juarez have been kidnapped and killed. We learn about their conditions and the war zone in Mexico, which are the center of this detective mystery. Behind the story is the role of NAFTA and the "Free Trade" zone imposed by the US on Mexico. While promising to "help" Mexico, NAFTA has created a slave labor union free environment for multi-nationals with a militarized drug war that threatens the lives of people throughout the region. Chelis Lopez of Radio Bi-Lingual will participate in a discussion after the film.

There will be a Photo display by Kilo of the more than 70,000 educators and other members of the Seccion 22 teachers' movement in Oaxaca, Mexico, who are striking and taking occupation action against privatization and the destruction of public education pushed by US billionaires and Arnie Duncan, Obama's secretary of Education.

The Unremitting War on Labor Art and History:

The Trial of Refregier's Murals at Rincon Annex to the Censorship of the Maine Murals Today

Following his slim electoral victory in 2011, the Republican Governor of Maine stripped a mural depicting Maine labor history from the walls of Maine's Labor Department building and hid it. The mural includes a depiction of Maine's native daughter Frances Perkins, first woman cabinet member, Secretary of Labor under all the terms of President Franklin Roosevelt and (among many other things) the person we can thank for Social Security and unemployment insurance. It also depicts the industries of the state and scenes of working people. This event will include a live video appearance by the mural's creator Judy Taylor, a background on the Congressional attempt to destroy the New Deal murals at San Francisco's Rincon Annex Post Office, and some history of New Deal public art programs. Presentors are geographer Gray Brechin of the Living New Deal Project and Harvey Smith of the National New Deal Preservation Association. This event is co-sponsored by the Berkeley City College Social Science Department.

Women On Strike (23 min.) 2010, Turkey Directed by Güliz Saglam, Feryal Saygılıgil

The Antalya Free Trade Zone was founded in 1987 and was one of the first "free trade zones". The women were in virtual concentration camps totally controlled by the bosses with massive work speed-ups and the loss of limbs and hands. Despite the oppressive conditions, the women learned about being an industrial worker, and what a union meant including labor solidarity. The women workers went on a strike that lasted from September 2006 to December 2007. Red Dust (20 min.) 2010, China By Karin T. Mak

Red cadmium dust drifted freely in China's nickel-cadmium battery factories owned and operated by GP BATTERIES (GP), one of the world's top battery manufacturers. Ren, a migrant worker originally from Sichuan, suffers from frequent headaches and breathing difficulties. If untreated, the cadmium poisoning can lead to kidney failure, cancer, and even death.

RED DUST tells an unexamined side of China's economic development: the resistance, courage, and hope of workers battling occupational disease, demanding justice from the local government and global capital. Chinese migrant workers

Whose Conspiracy, Justice For The Shrewsbury Pickets

(40 min.) 2010, UK By Chris Reeves of Platform Films



This documentary shows the frame up and political victimization 24 Shrewsbury building trades workers after their successful 1972 building trades workers strike. Two of them Des Warren and Ricky Tomlinson were jailed for years on conspiracy charges after the original criminal charges were dropped against the workers in order to make them an example of what happens to trade unionists when you fight back. The video includes interviews with Des Warren and other workers about how this struggle affected their lives. This has important lessons for all US workers who face an effort to criminalize effective trade unionism from the use of the Taft-Hartley to growing anti-labor legislation aimed at destroying organizing labor. 
Last Stand At Nymboida (56 min.) Australia By Jeff Bird take over and run their jobs without corporate management.

Thirty miners in an Australian primitive mine in the Nymboida Valley in Northern New South Wales are faced with the sack in 1975 but in a last desperate action to save the jobs they decide to take over the mine and run it themselves. Although this was illegal under the law and they had no management experience, they decided that they had no other choice. "Their enthusiasm and hard work lead to a miraculous transformation - and against all expectations the mine was soon turning a profit!" This story of workers control was a important experience of the ability of workers to





A site-specific performance based on the funeral march for the two workers killed on Bloody Thursday, whose deaths sparked the historic 1934 San Francisco General Strike. The aerial dance will take place on the side of the historic Rincon Annex Post Office building, which features WPA era murals that honor the strike. Directly across from Rincon is 113 Steuart Street, the longshore union headquarters during the strike and where the funeral march began. Flyaway Productions incorporates the building's features into their choreography, utilizing rigging to create space and movement. Their dances are visually exciting and thoughtprovoking and the company has received significant press for their work.

In honor of the Labor Archives and Research Center's 25th anniversary, the Archives has commissioned Jo Kreiter and Flyaway Productions to create and perform a site-specific



aerial dance commemorating the 1934 San Francisco General Strike. The dance will focus on the funeral march held July 9, 1934 for two workers slain by police and will incorporate the facade of the historic Rincon Annex Post Office, home to stunning WPA murals that include depictions of the 1934 General Strike. The 10 minute dance will be performed twice in the day, with a labor landmarks walking tour of nearby sites in between performances.

A Month In Madison: Eye-Witness Reports From The Wisconsin Protests

On February 11, 2011, Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker introduced a "budget repair bill" that threatened the rights and livelihoods of Wisconsin's labor unions, schools and citizens. The bill sparked massive, ongoing protests that have grown into the largest peaceful demonstrations in history, inspiring similar uprisings around the country.

When protesters occupied the Capitol in Madison, San Francisco documentary producer Joan Juster bought a oneway ticket to Wisconsin to document these historic events. He was sentenced to life imprisonment and has been in jail for 37 years, and is now filing the second application for retrial. He has also received support from trade unionists in Japan and the US. their international solidarity campaign. A video on his case and the struggle during that period edited by Manabu Minagawa will be shown during the exhibition period.

This led to a witch hunt against labor and the defeat of working class candidate Job Harriman in the Los Angeles elections. Both these events will be focused on during this event.

Clara Lemlich, a young 17-year old Russian immigrant like many other young immigrant women in New York was in the garment industry. Despite her small stature she stood up for the women, young and old, who toiled in the garment shops and factories.


She was also targeted by the bosses, who hired thugs and goons to beat up the union activists and Clara was beaten



numerous times. Despite the great costs to her health and even her life, she continued organizing. At a mass meeting at NY Cooper Union she spoke up for many when she said it was time for a mass strike. This was unanimously agreed and in 1909, to, twenty thousand garment workers went

on strike. That was called the "The Uprising".

Despite the efforts to get a union at the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory, the anti-labor owners refused to sign a union contract. The failure to get a contract led to continued dangerous working conditions and also locked escape doors.



The death however led to an explosion of anger and support for union and labor rights that are now under attack.

Lee Boek, Public Works Improvisational Theater Company, will present a theater piece on the 1911 LA Times bombing and the shaping of Los Angeles. The attack on organized




labor, particularly union ironworkers and organizers John J. ("J.J.") and James B. ("J.B.") McNamara in Los Angeles, was a critical part of Los Angeles and California labor history. 



Wobblies on the Waterfront: Interracial Unionism in Progressive-Era Philadelphia

"Ben Fletcher: the WWI era's most important, if forgotten, African American Labor Leader"

Author and historian Peter Cole's talk will examine the history of Ben Fletcher and the union he helped lead, Local 8, which was the most successful interracial labor union in US history prior to the rise of the CIO in the 1930s. Led by Fletcher, the best known black Wobbly, thousands of black men, allied with thousands of whites, both native-born and immigrant, to make Local 8 a force to be reckoned with in the WWI era, an era when most unions, like almost all institutions, excluded blacks or, at best, segregated them. In contrast, Fletcher and the Industrial Workers of the World—to which Local 8 belonged—both preached and practiced racial equality. The rise and fall of this union reveals the extent of what was possible in regards to interracial unionism in the most racist era since the abolition of slavery. This union helped lay the foundation for subsequent unions committed to civil rights including San Francisco's own International Longshore & Warehouse Union.

This walk will revisit the sites of Oakland's "Work Holiday" that began spontaneously with rank-and-file solidarity with the striking - mostly women - retail clerks at Kahn's and Hastings department store whose picket line was being broken by police scab herding. Within 24 hours, it involved over 100,000 workers and shut down nearly all commerce in the East Bay for 54 hours. In 1946 there were six general strikes across the U.S.; that year set the all-time record year for strikes and work stoppages. The Oakland "Work Holiday" was the last general strike to ever occur in the U.S. and the walk and history talk will attempt to keep alive the memory of this tradition of community-wide working class solidarity.

Founded in 1854 as the first U.S. Naval installation in the Pacific, Mare Island Naval Shipyard in Vallejo was the Navy's largest civilian shipyard, employing at its peak of production during WWII more than 40,000 workers, including women-Rosie the Riveters, as they became known. On August 9, 1944, 3 weeks after the Port Chicago Explosion that resulted in the greatest loss of life on home soil during WWII, 258 African American sailors took a stand that changed history, yet few people know where their "work stoppage" viewed as a way to bargain for better and safer working conditions, took place. Visit Mare Island Naval Ammunition Depot in Vallejo where the men were ordered to return to loading munitions. Their refusal to return to work resulted in the Navy's court-martial and imprisonment of 50 men. Due to advocacy by then NAACP lawyer Thurgood Marshall and even Eleanor Roosevelt, the Navy became the first of America's armed services to desegregate. 
